Zoom Basics

Before we get started, it's important to know what kind of device you're using with Zoom.

Some instructions will be a little bit different depending on what kind of computer you're using. We'll use the symbols below to tell you when that happens. Read the descriptions below and circle the symbol for what you're using.



Apple computer (Mac)

Apple computers have an apple symbol on them. Our video lessons are filmed using an Apple computer, so what you see on our screen will be very similar to what you see on yours. Look for this symbol in the workbook for instructions that are just for Apple computers, also known as Macs.



Personal computer (PC)

If your computer doesn't have the Apple symbol on it, it's a PC. Look for this symbol in the workbook for instructions that are just for PCs. When watching the videos, which are recorded with an Apple computer, we'll call out when you can expect to see something differently because you're using a PC.

Put your birthday in and click "Continue."



Enter the email address you want to use for your Zoom account, and click "Sign Up."


> Make sure you have immediate access to this email account, since Zoom will send a verification email.



- In response to "Are you signing up on behalf of a school?" click "No," then "Continue."

- Under the title "Welcome to Zoom," type in:
 - Your First Name
 - Your Last Name
 - A Password that has at least 8 characters (both uppercase and lowercase), and at least 1 letter and 1 number.

Type the password again in the second box to confirm it. Write this password down somewhere safe. Hit "Continue."

- ☐ Adjust your camera angle so your friend can see you best. It's just your friend, but pretend it's a big event. How would you want to look?
